DR. THOMAS HARRINGTON '52

Born in 1934, Tom Harrington's early years were marked by the aftermath of the Great Depression and the onset of World War II. The scarcity of jobs and the rationing of essentials like food and gasoline profoundly shaped his upbringing, teaching him resilience. He often made an 8-mile round trip, pulling a little red wagon to carry food home. His childhood in Dorchester, where he attended St. Matthews Elementary, was characterized by weekend familial gatherings and athletic activities, enhancing his strength as he managed household chores like tending the furnace and hauling oil to their kitchen stove.

Tom funded his education through part-time work, including operating an elevator in a building that housed the FBI, witnessing the stark contrasts in prisoner treatment, creating custom tie-dyed T-shirts which led to daily nosebleeds, and being the sole male participant in the annual school play at Mount St. Joseph Academy, experiences that significantly broadened his social horizons.

Despite no family history of attending college, Tom's father and two uncles became his staunchest supporters. During this time, he met his future wife, Joan. Sister Honora, his grade 12 mentor, remained a guiding influence through life changes.

With a Bachelor's degree in Sociology from Boston College but facing limited job prospects, Tom pursued a teaching license, followed by a Master's degree from Boston State College. He earned certifications as a Guidance Counselor and School Psychologist. His work caught the attention of two Purdue University professors, leading to an Assistantship and a PhD in Counseling Psychology, further enhanced by postdoctoral studies at MIT Sloan School of Management.

Facing the challenge of serving a large student population as a School Guidance Counselor, he, alongside his wife, Joan C. Harrington, developed the Harrington/O'Shea Career Decision-Making System (CDM), a pioneering career exploration tool in the 1970s. Joan's meticulous organization and revision of manuscripts underpinned their work, creating a self-scoring, self-administering, and self-interpreting tool that integrated interests with career choices, reflecting preferences, values, abilities, and future training plans. In 1996, this tool was recognized as the most effective among ten career assessment tools in a national survey of high school counselors, and a letter from the Associate Director of the National Institute of Education in 1975 commended the CDM as the first interest inventory to meet their guidelines for gender fairness. By 2002, the instrument, available in English and Spanish, had been used by millions, with an additional three-quarters of a million users each year thereafter.

In 2004, as an Emeritus Professor at Northeastern University, Tom received the Eminent Career Award at the National Career Development Convention, the highest accolade in the field. He credits his incredible success to the foundational instruction he received from Cathedral High School, and is honored to be recognized with an induction into the inaugural Academic Hall of Fame.

Roger Scott was born in South Boston in 1946 to George and Helen Scott. He attended grammar school at Saint Peter's in South Boston, where he was educated by the Sisters of Jesus Crucified. Throughout his time there, he consistently maintained a position on the honor roll, laying a strong foundation in mathematics thanks to the Sisters' robust teaching.

Upon passing his entrance exam, Scott advanced to Cathedral High School, where he experienced significant educational and spiritual growth under the Sisters of Saint Joseph. Sister Eugene Marie, in particular, had a profound impact on him, significantly enriching his passion for mathematics during his four years at Cathedral High. The dedicated Sisters were instrumental in shaping his personal and academic development.

It was at Cathedral that he met Ann Richards, a member of the class of 1964 and the love of his life. This November, they will celebrate 55 years of marriage, a union blessed with three children—Christian, Leanne, and Zachary—and six grandchildren who bring immense joy into their lives.

Scott pursued higher education at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, where he earned a five-year Bachelor of Science Degree. He remained on the Dean's List throughout his college years and was a member of the Rho Chi Honor Society. He also served as the vice president of the Class of 1969 and was tentatively accepted, pending a physical examination, as one of twenty pharmacists nationwide to join the Commissioned Corps of the U.S. Public Health Service.
